REBUILDING POWER

We need workplace organisation that brings our members together in maximum unity. Mark will:

NEW CHALLENGES

As our organising strategy builds workplace power in branches, it's time to actively pursue our long standing bargaining objectives and raise new demands over the fresh challenges members face. The recent UK civil service strike ballot only just fell short of the 50% threshold, and demonstrated that we have massive support from the membership for action over pay. Mark will:

• Build the union's strength to win a UK civil service ballot on pay.

 Step up the campaign for national pay bargaining in the UK civil service.

 Raise new demands on the digitalisation/automation of work and a reduction in working hours..

PRIVATE SECTOR

Mark has prioritised resources for organising workers in the private sector so we build healthy union workplaces everywhere. Mark also proposed and campaigned for a reserved private sector seat on the NEC.

Mark has thrown his weight behind the new industrial militancy among outsourced workers in government departments, who share the same buildings and workplace environments as our public sector members. Mark will:

Devote resources and digital technology to

organising workers in private sector employers.

• Campaign politically and industrially for civil service contractors to

pay the real living wage.

 Drive for contracted services to be brought in-house and to protect the terms and conditions of members if transferred to private sector employers.

DEVOLVED NATIONS

PCS represents workers across the UK and there are obvious political and industrial differences across regions and nations. Currently, PCS policy on social and economic issues is made at ADC. Yet many legislative decisions like housing and welfare are devolved to Scotland, Wales and N. Ireland. Mark believes that it is time our union tackles this democratic deficit. Mark will:

Recognise the changes brought about by devolution and review

our campaigning strategy.

• Begin discussions in the union to improve our policy-making on issues impacting our members' lives in Scotland, Wales and NI.

• Strengthen existing good relations with political parties in Holyrood, the Senedd and Stormont to win the best for our members in all parts of the UK.

EQUALITY

Under Mark's leadership, PCS equalities networks have flourished and are represented on the NEC. Fighting for equal pay, campaigning against racist organisations and stamping out homophobia are essential to PCS.

But we can do even more. For example, despite having 60% women members, women aren't fairly represented in the union. Less than half of workplace reps are women, with men also making up nearly 70% of ADC delegates and GEC members. For this reason, Mark strongly supports the proposal to guarantee at least 50% women on the NEC.

In the workplace, discrimination, bullying and harassment are rising. Punitive sick absence procedures heap pressure on people with disabilities. We need a zero tolerance approach towards bullies and bullying management cultures. Mark will:

 Advance workplace equality organising to fight back hard against racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, and

bullying.

• Introduce structured mentoring programmes for women, BME, disabled, LGBT+ and young members to grow their campaigning power and increase their participation on the union's democratic bodies. Consult across the union on how best to develop policy-making within equality groups.

TORIES

As General Secretary, Mark has determinedly advanced our members' views, much to the disquiet of the British political establishment. Whether calling out Francis Maude's lies on television, standing up against austerity when no political party would or taking on the Tories over attacks on pay and conditions, Mark Serwotka champions the demands of PCS members.

Today, Jeremy Corbyn and John McDonnell's radical leadership of the Labour party offers us a unique opportunity. At ADC 2019, branches confirmed that a Corbyn-led Labour Government is in the interests of PCS members. Now we are consulting on how best to help achieve that. Mark believes we must throw the weight of PCS behind the campaign for a Corbyn-led government. Mark is trusted by both Jeremy Corbyn and John McDonnell, having worked closely with them over many years. That's why PCS has never had greater influence over the Labour front bench than wedo now; as demonstrated by their commitment to restore national pay bargaining in the UK civil service, end office closures and re-introduce facility time for our reps. Mark will:

- Forcefully put PCS members' concerns to all politicians of all parties. Capitalise on the union's political influence with the shadow front bench to secure radical policies that are in the interests of PCS members.
 Support proposals on how we can best help to get a Corbyn-led Labour UK government elected.
